### ZOO REPORT

#### Definition

The word zoo was first used in the 19th century. It is short for zoological aardens.

Zoological comes from the Greek word zoion which means animal. Zoos are places where the public can go to view animals.

#### History

No one is really certain when the first zoo was in existence. There are records from China in the 12th century BC that show there were animals kept near the Emperor's palace. There is also evidence that the Ancient Egyptians had zoos.

The Romans kept animals in zoos and trained them to entertain and fight. In AD57 they had polar bears fighting seals and elephants and bears were trained to fight in the coliseums. Also, gladiators fought lions and criminals and prisoners were fed to lions - all for entertainment.
