**Grammar:** Revision of expanded noun phrases. Try the attached sheets reminding you about expanded noun phrases. Remember it is a phrase that has an 1 adjective or more with a noun. I would like you to think about 2 adjectives. Remember they need to be separated by a comma. For example: The beautiful, blue butterfly flew into the flower. Remember also that an adjective describes a noun. A noun is a name of thing, place or person.

**English:** Analysis: Attached to the home learning page are 3 house adverts. Read them and then think about these questions. You may want to write things onto the sheet, highlight or underline key features. This will help you when you eventually come to write your own advert later.

Does the advert have a picture? Is it a detailed enough picture for you?

Does it tell you how much it is?

Where it is?

Can you underline or highlight any words that are trying to persuade you to buy the house?

Any good adjectives?

Who do you think currently owns the house? (Clue they are all fairy tale characters.)

Would you buy the house?

Could you think of any way you could improve the advert? What words would you use?

**Geography:** Either go for a walk down West End in the centre of Osmotherley or look on Street View. We are going to be looking at the human features (manmade) of the road. Make a tally chart and count how many of each feature you can see. E.g. houses, pubs, cafes, roads etc. Then make a pictogram or bar chart of your findings. Which feature can you see the most of? Why do you think that may be?
