Good afternoon year 5 and 6.

This half-term's overarching focus question in R.E. is *What do* religions say to us when life gets hard?

We will be investigating this particularly from the perspective of Christians, Hindus and Humanists.

Today we are going to investigate how people are guided in life by the rules/principles/beliefs within their faith.

Christians and Humanists share the golden rule <mark>to treat others as</mark> you would like to be treated.

Think carefully about the following lockdown situations and write how you think a Humanist/Christian would react:

A policeman comes over to a group of believers having a gathering to support each other in the park to remind them about social distancing. The policeman asks the crowd to disperse.

Old people live alone in the neighbourhood.

Neighbours have to be shielded and not allowed out (even to shop)their family lives far away.

There's a news bulletin that the local hospital is going to run out of protective clothing.

A family of four walks in a horizontal line down the pavement towards the person of faith. They do not move out of the way and come closer and closer towards the one person. They are taking up the **whole** pavement.

A teenager says to Humanist or Christian teenagers, "Just come round to my house after dark even if it's not allowed. No-one will know."
