For the first year since the end of the pandemic, our local swimming pool was able to accommodate Osmotherley Primary School for swimming sessions this year. We were allocated sessions in the summer term (after Year 11 students had left school which provided capacity).
 What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 metres? N.B.
